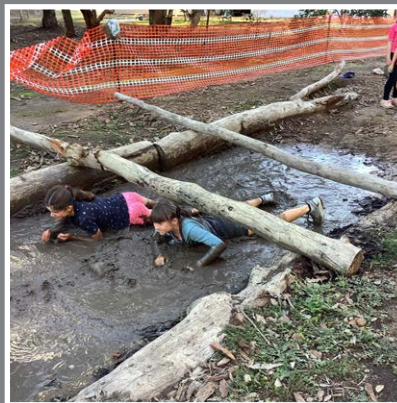

Children's Book Week runs from Saturday 21 August - Friday 27 August - week 6 term 3.

The Children's Book Council of Australia has brought children and books together across Australia during Book Week since 1945. During this time schools and public libraries have spent one glorious week a year celebrating books and Australian children's authors and illustrators. Shortlists of recently published books are nominated and on the Friday before Book Week, the Book of the Year and winners in various categories are announced. These shortlisted books are on display in the library and teachers will be reading them to classes during the term.

To celebrate this year's theme, 'Old Worlds, New Worlds, Other Worlds', students in years K – 6 are invited to dress as a book character, author or something relating to the theme for our Book Parade on Friday August 27. Coordinate with friends and come up with a group costume, or go it alone – either way, it's a great way to celebrate reading! Students are encouraged to bring their book along to school with them if possible. Costumes do not need to be elaborate and can often be created from items already found at home. Use the holidays to start planning your costume, and be sure to visit the library early in Term 3 for more information!



LUNCHTIME CONCERT

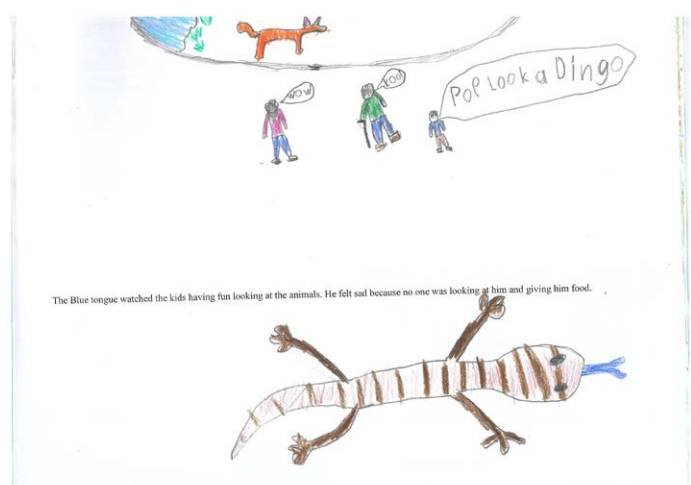
SINGER/SONGWRITER CODEE-LEE DOWN

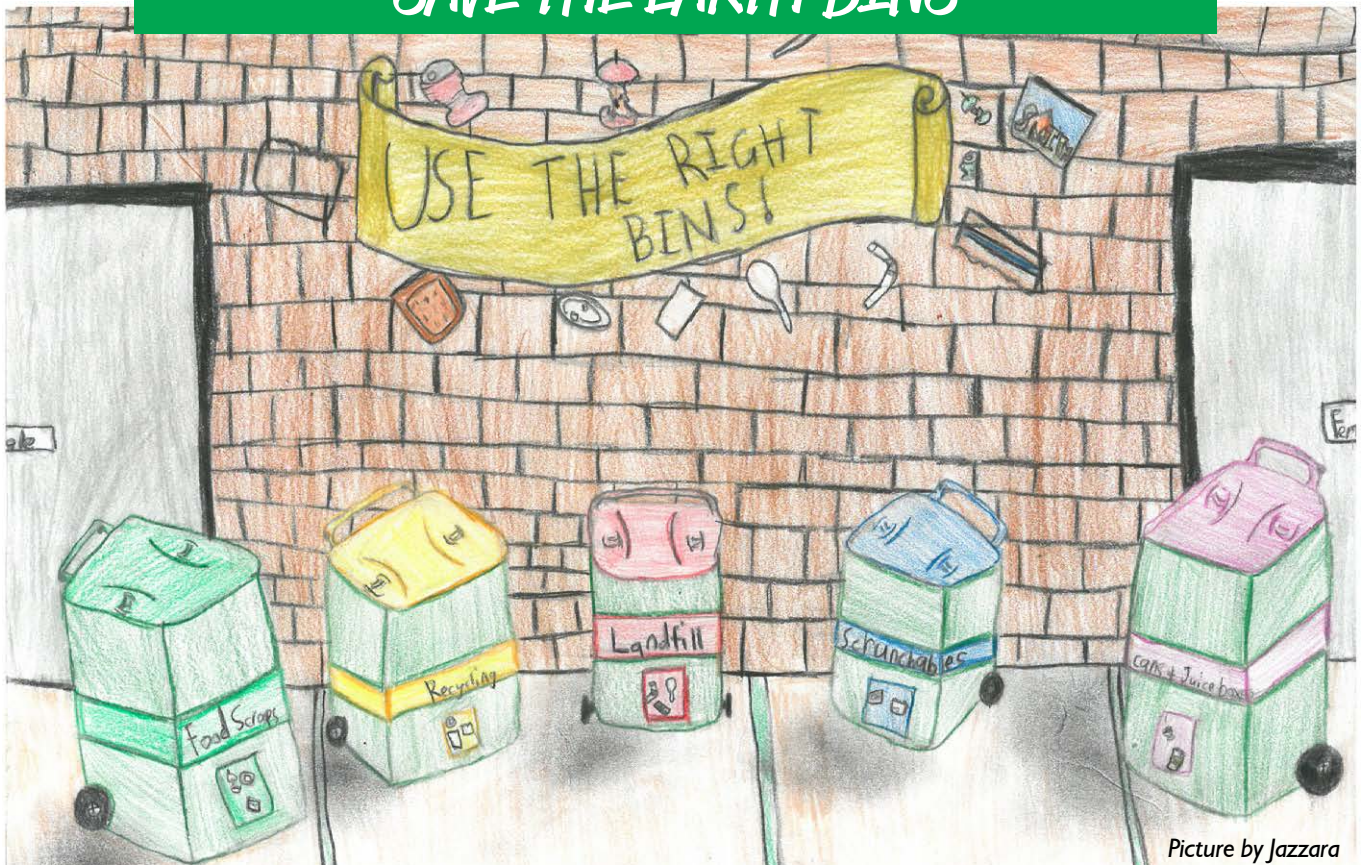


THE MIXED-UP BLUE TONGUE LIZARD

LANDFILL

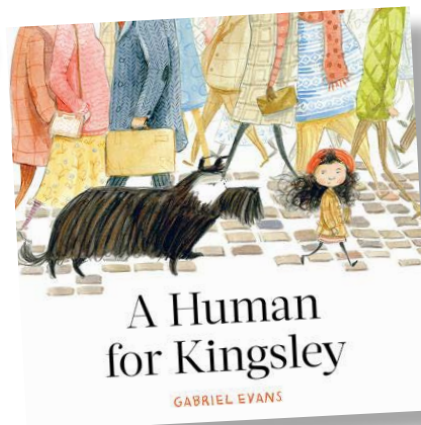
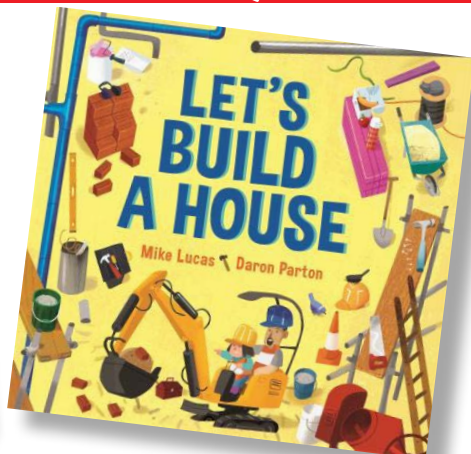
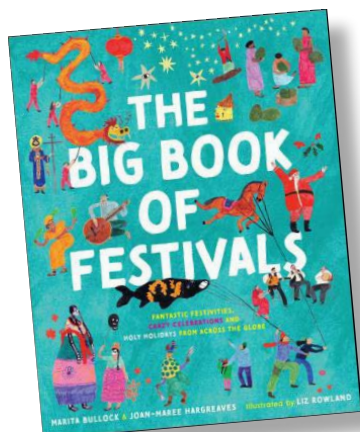

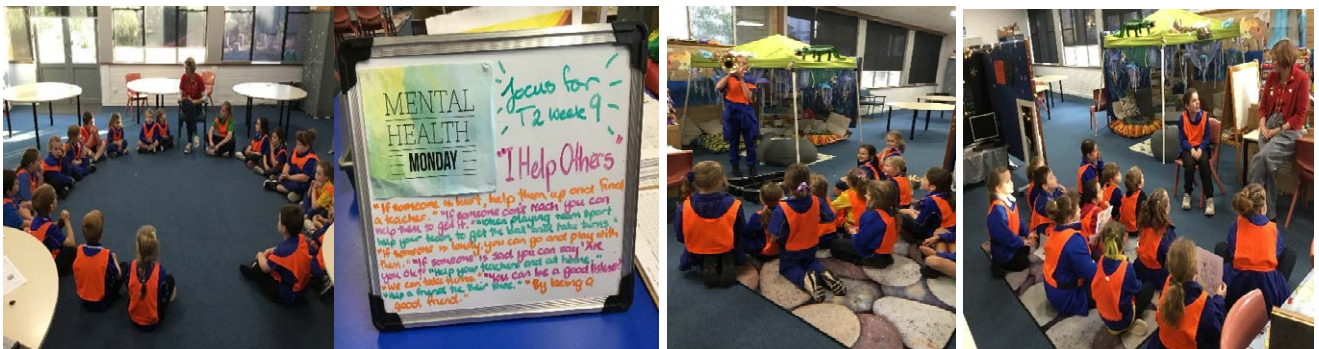
OSHClub News

During this term we have introduced themes to each day to ensure that we are providing our children with a wide range of experiences when they attend Adam Road OSHClub. We have been focussing on our mental wellbeing through Mental Health Monday when we choose a mantra to learn about, understand and put into practice each week. Over the past few weeks our focus was on "I am Loving" and "I Help Others". The children brainstorm what they think this might look like in our daily lives and discuss how we can focus on and practice these skills both at OSHClub and at home.

Tuesdays we focus on news sharing with Tuesday Newsday, here the children are given the opportunity to practice their public speaking and oral presentation skills as well as active listening. Everyone is given a turn to share something with the group with a focus on belonging to the group. We have been celebrating World Music Wednesdays, our most popular day. The children have the opportunity to choose a country from the music box. We listen to music from that country, explore the cultural practices of that countries people, engage in crafts and sometimes try some different foods. This week we learnt about Argentina as one of our family's parents came from Argentina we were able to share stories and traditions with the group. The children enjoyed exploring the culture and listening to the music from Argentina, and to learn first hand about some special cultural practices.

Thankful Thursdays are all about reflecting on the little positive experiences we have each day. We have been having a Yarning Circle where we pass the talking stick and each share a positive thought with the group. This has become a fantastic way for our children to focus on the positive moments and to share in each other's successes.

Fridays we keep Flexible by handing over control of the program to the children. They get to decide what activities are done and when. It's a lovely and relaxed way to end the week.
